Charles Haddon Spurgeon was born June 19, 1834, at Kelvedon, Essex. He was the son of an independent, preacher and was educated at Colchester. He became an usher of a school at Newmarket, but embracing Baptist views, joined a and village preacher, and at the age of eighteen, minister of a small chapel at Waterbeach, where he soon became woted for his zeal and eloquence. He went to London in 1853, where he at once attracted audiences so numerous that the congregation was compelled to remove first to Exeter hall, and thence to the still larger Surrey hall. In 1861 an immense chapel, called the tabernacle, was built for him in Newington Butts, London, where he has since preached.
