The Australian system of registering titles to land, when it becomes better known, is likely to become as popular as the Australian system of voting. It is popularly known as the Torrens system, from its author Sir Robert Torrens who introduced it into South Australia in 1858. The system gives the purchaser of real estate absolute protection while the transfer is as simple and inexpensive as the transfer of shares of bank or railway stock. The state guarantees the title of every piece of real estate accepted for registration, first determining the ownership and thereafter permitting it to pass from hand to hand with all the facility attending the transfer of a horse or a carriage. The owner of real estate is at liberty to cling to the old system if he so wills, but so advantageous is the plan that in those countries where it has been adopted not one transfer in a thousand is made under the old system.

The Albany Democrat undoubtedly voices the sentiments of a large number of persons in the democratic party when it says: "It is possible, but not certain, that the raid now made on the democracy by Senator Hill for a presidential nomination may defeat the selection of Mr. Cleveland as a candidate; but there is no possible contingency in which Hill could effect his own nomination. The democrats of the nation are not prepared to enter one of the most important contests in our political history with a candidate who symbolizes the purpose to nationalize saloon politics, with political theft as one of the jewels of the new political constellation."

CALL FOR A REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION.

Call for a Republican State Convention.
