The Oregonian says. The Wasco *Sun* sets up the most absurd complaint that the division of Oregon into congressional districts is a gerrymander. Eastern Oregon, it is complained, is attached to a portion of Western Oregon. The explanation is simple. Eastern Oregon had only one-half the population necessary for one member of congress, and Western Oregon had more than enough for one. This was adjusted in the apportionment as fairly and conveniently as it could be done. The counties of Western Oregon that are most easy of access to Eastern Oregon and most united in interest were joined to the eastern counties. Representatives in congress are based on population, not on territory.

The Multnomah delegation acted handsomely toward Eastern Oregon, at the state convention in the matter of nominating the congressional candidate for the second district. Multnomah's 43 ballots were cast blank till the fourth ballot when they went over almost solidly for Ellis who was then and from the first far in the lead. It is refreshing to find an example of good faith, once in a while among politicians.

Senator Hilton came near being nominated for congressman. He got three votes! He was understood to be Simon's candidate, as he was unquestionably Moody's, who failing to get anything for himself wanted the next best thing—a man he could use. It would be interesting to know just who cast the three ballots for Hilton. The Wasco county delegation was instructed to support Ellis. Did any of them go back on their instructions?

Hughitt to Succeed Dillon.
New York, April 7.—The books for the Union Pacific railway annual election April 27th, were closed yesterday, and forthwith a report was current that Dillon will retire from the presidency, and that Martin Hughitt, now president of the Chicago and Northwestern, will succeed him. It was also intimated that in the reorganization of the directors of the Union Pacific the Gould representatives, including Gould, will be dropped, while men who belonged to the Vanderbilt army of railroad henchmen will take their places. Gould, it is said, will devote his energies to the rejuvenation of his Missouri Pacific system. If, as is reported, Hughitt and his group of co-workers are to manage the Union Pacific, it means that at last the Vanderbilt dream of a transcontinental system has been realized.
