road company having been organized in that city on the 4th inst., called the Tacoma, Lake Park and Columbia river railway company, with a capital stock of \$3,000,000. The Tacoma and Lake Park Cor. Second and Union Sts., railroad, 12 miles in length, has been transferred to the new company and it is said that the work of extending that road to the Tilton river, 50 miles distant from Tacoma, will commence next month. The plan is to finish the road to The Dalles this summer and here connect with the Union Pacific system. The line, it is said, will be about 150 miles in length. It will traverse Pierce, Lewis, Skamania and Klickitat counties and cross the mountains by Cowlitz pass. Just how the proposed road will traverse Skamania county and go through the Cowlitz pass we are not told. If it traverses the one it surely cannot go through the other, as any one may see by consulting a map of Washington, We shall be glad of anything that will open up the country and reduce the cost of transportation but we greatly fear that it will be a long time before a road is built over the above described
