A Railway to the Source of the Amazon.

The government of Bolivia has granted to Fernando Cordena, an Argentine engineer, an important concession for the construction of a railway from Oruro, Bolivia, to the head of navigation on the Amazon river, in the heart of the rubber region of Bolivia. The construction of this road will connect the mineral regions of Bolivia with the Atlantic, and thus give cheap transportation to Europe.

The government of Bolivia has guaranteed Senor Cordena 6 per cent. interest annually for twenty years on the capital invested, has given him nine miles on each side of the proposed line from which to take materials for construction purposes, and in addition has granted him 100 square leagues of land, to be taken at intervals from the territory adjacent to the road.—London Engineer.

A Precaution Against Influenza. Of all the precautions taken against the spread of influenza none are more thoroughly good in intention than those which have been adopted at Dover. The authorities there have posted up notices to the effect that a penalty of five pounds will be inflicted upon persons exposing themselves in public places when suffering from the malady. But it is disputed whether the malady is contagious, though that it is so has become the general belief.—London Tit-Bits.
