throwing of stones and filth. Several times, it is stated, the Muezzin was struck. After he had retired the disturbers burst into the mosque and threw stones, one of which fell within a few inches of where the little son of Ahmed Quiliam Bey was kneeling in prayer. These annoyances, it is added, continued during the service, and the congregation on leaving were pelted and struck.—London Public Opinion.
