SATURDAY'S EXCURSION.

Market picnic to the Cascades on Saturday next.

The steamer Regulator will give The Dalles people an opportunity to make a Grand Market Picnic to the Cascades, Saturday, May 21st, leaving her berth at the foot of Union street at 7:30 o'clock a. m., and returning at 7 p. m. Excursionists will be given about three hours at the Cascades, which will afford ample time to see the Columbia in its angry mood, and notice for themselves the condition of things at the foot of the canal. The fare for the round trip, has been placed at 50 cents, in order that any one who may wish to avail themselves of the opportunity, may have a chance to do so. MARKET REVIEW.

Business in the city has been active during the past week, with good footings. Prices remain unchanged, save a slight decline in sugar.

The wool market is inactive, although there are large arrivals daily. Buyers and sellers are apart on concessions and holders demand better prices than buyers are willing to pay. Some few lots have changed hands at 12 1/2 for heavy, and 15 for extra light staple. There seems to be a disposition on the part of holders to ship on their own account, feeling confident of better results, than to sell on a home market.

The salmon run is not up to the average for the season of year. More blue backs are caught than formerly, from some unknown cause. Chinook salmon are selling to the canneries at four cents per pound. As soon as the river gets a better stage, a better run is expected.

The grain market is quiet, as the country is quite clear of all grain. Prices remain on old quotations. Summer fruits, such as strawberries, gooseberries and currants, are finding ready sale at fair prices on the market with a limited daily supply.

Shorts and middlings, \$22.50 to \$25.00 per ton. Chop corn at \$28.00 to \$30.00 per ton. Rolled barley at \$25.00 per ton.

HAY—Timothy hay is in good supply at quotations \$14.00 to \$15.00. Wheat hay is quoted at \$12.50 to \$13.00 per ton, and scarce, baled. Wild hay is quoted at \$12.00 to \$13.00 per ton. Alfalfa \$12.00 baled. Oat hay \$13.00.

POTATOES—A bit scarce at 85 cents a sack.

BUTTER—We quote \$1.40 to 50 cents per roll, and very plentiful.

EGGS—Are not coming in freely and the market strong, we quote 16 to 18 cents.

POULTRY—Fowls are in better supply at \$4.00 to per dozen.

APPLES—Out of market.

VEGETABLES—Cabbage, turnips, carrots and onions, 1 1/2 cent per pound.

HAMS—Prime dry hams are quoted at .06 per lb. Culls .04 to .05. Green .02 1/2 to .03. Salt .02 to .04. Sheep pelts 1.00 to 1.75. Butchers' 75 to 1.00. Bear skins \$6 to \$8; coyote .00; mink 50 cents each; martin \$1.00; beaver \$1.75 to \$3.00 per lb.; otter, \$2.00 to \$5.00 each for Al; coon, 30 each; badger, 25 each; fisher, \$2.50 to \$4.00 each; Red Fox, \$10.00; Dillon gray, \$25.00; Black Fox, \$25.00; Pole cat, \$2.50; Wild cat, \$5.00; Hedgehog, \$1.00 to \$3.00.

New Style of Coon Hunting.

The inhabitants of the mountains west of this place are great coon hunters. Some nights ago Bill Benchoff and Colonel Yingling started out with half a dozen dogs and two boys to carry the pine torches. A coon was raised on the east side of the Monterey, and the dogs chased it down through a deep and rough ravine and up a rocky spur on the west.
