A MATTER OF COMPLEXION.

Blood Women Said to Be Growing Scarcer, Giving Place to Brunettes. "Blond women are becoming scarcer every year," said an eminent anthropologist. "You have not lived long enough to remark the fact, but women with blue eyes and light hair are gradually passing away as a type."

"The same thing is true of men. Among their sex light hair and blue eyes are fast disappearing. You may judge how rapidly they are going when you consider the fact that wherever a brun man marries a blond woman or vice versa 66 per cent. of the children born have dark hair and eyes."
