In the Oregonian account of the settlement of Capt. J. H. Fiske with D. V. B. Henarie, Capt. Fiske says: "The state election had turned out differently I should not have consented to dismiss the case." He settled on the basis of \$5,000; barely enough to cover his expense of the litigation, and as he has a number of personal friends who believed he had a good cause, who are surprised at the turn affairs have taken they naturally inquire: "What had the state election to do with it?"

Mark Lane Express reports that the British wheat crop this year will be about 1,250,000 bushels under that of 1891. Barley promises well. A good yield of oats depends on the rain fall. The continued drain on English wheats is liable to make the average price under 30s. Foreign has fallen 1s. California is selling at 35s 6d. Barley has declined 6d and corn 2d at Liverpool and 6d at London. American oats are 3d cheaper.

During the three years ending March 31, 1889, the balance of trade was to our favor to the amount of \$28,984,379, or a yearly average of \$9,661,459. During the three years ending March 31, 1892 the balance of trade in our favor was \$28,197,367 or an annual average of \$9,399,122. This is the way the McKinley law is killing our commerce, and the history of the world furnishes no parallel.

Whatever opinion men may entertain of the value and practicability of The Dalles boat railway scheme it is beyond question that Senator Dolph and Mr. Herman have both fought earnestly for the passage of the bill. If any blame is attached to its defeat the blame will rest on Governor Penney and Paul Mohr.

Shipping at San Francisco is exceptionally dull for this season of the year. There are no arrivals or departures to speak of, and wharves that are usually stirring with life are deserted. Everybody has a reason to assign for the lack of business and want of activity, but opinions help matters very little.

The ruling price in the leading markets for wheat today may be summarized thus: Portland, valley \$1.32 1/2 @ \$1.36; Walla Walla \$1.27 1/2 @ \$1.30; San Francisco \$1.43 1/2; Chicago .78 1/2.

A petition asking the United States senate not to pass the Springer free wool bill has received the signatures of nearly nine-tenths of all the leading wool manufacturers of the country.

A census bulletin lately issued shows that our combined state, county, municipal and school district debt was \$22.40 per capita in 1880 and had fallen to \$18.13 in 1890.

Married on His Deathbed.

Wednesday Stroud Van Meter and Miss Spencer were married at Marengo, Crawford county, Ind., the bridegroom at the time being on his deathbed. About ten days ago Van Meter and two brothers were injured by the premature explosion of a blast of dynamite while working in a quarry near Marengo, his injuries consisting of a broken leg and arm, the loss of an eye and internal injuries that will almost certainly cause his death. The wounded man and Miss Spencer had been for some months betrothed, and were only waiting for an improvement in their financial circumstances to have the ceremony performed. When the accident occurred the young woman insisted that the ceremony be performed at once in order that she might be at liberty to care for her betrothed.—Louisville Courier-Journal.

Millions of Red Herring.

The waters of the inlet at this time of the year are fairly alive with red herring. The general belief is that shipping will drive these fish from any waters, but any one standing on the deck of a boat lying in the stream can see millions of them now. Saturday afternoon several boys were observed fishing in the old Indian fashion, and they secured a lot of fish. The Indian method is as follows: Take a slender pole about twenty feet long and drive in on one side a dozen or two of temporary nails; then, sitting in the bow of the boat, propel it by paddling with the pole. The pole, in passing through the water, catches the fish on the nails. In this way a large quantity may be caught in a short time.
