**The End of a Connecticut Bull Case.**  
After the celebrated Winsted bull case was ended on Friday the bull was decorated with ribbons and flags and led through Main street. Upon the upper part of the bull's appendage the animal had a handsome bouquet made of white ribbons; his horns were garlanded with yellow ribbons, around his body was a surcingle, and each of his sides was ornamented with an American flag. He was a gaudy looking bovine, and his appearance drew plenty of attention from the crowd of people on the streets.
