Bees Carry Toilet Cases.
The tongue of the hive bee is a most elaborate structure, admirably fitted for helping to pump up nectar. The wax producing organs of the bee are certain glands on the underside of the abdomen, which are surmounted by thin plates, on which the wax is deposited in flakes like miniature fish scales. It is taken from these plates by a pair of shears or cutters, admirably adapted for the purpose and formed between two joints of the hind legs.
It is passed to the mouth, where it is chewed and rendered plastic by the jaws. The hind legs have many beautiful structures and modifications fitted for gathering pollen and cleansing the bee, while on the front legs there is a regular comb and brush, admirably adapted for cleaning the antennae or feelers, which are very delicate and important sense organs.—Boston Transcript.
