Argaments for and Against Suffrage.

Once a year in Massachusetts women have the opportunity to take part in a very limited way in the ordering of public affairs by voting, if they choose to do so, for members of the scho in their respective towns or cities. Once a year, with equal regularity, the legislature is asked to extend this privilege by giving women the right either to vote for all elective local or municipal officers. or to take part in general elections with

the same powers as men. The extent to which the women avail themselves of the limited privilege which they now have is often made the basis of argument for or against an extension of the suffrage; while, on the other hand, the advocates of full suffrage for women claim it as a right founded on the broadest principles of natural justice and not to be impaired by any considerations of our artificial society.—Boston Common-
