Henry George indorses Cleveland's nomination very warmly. But somehow the democrats don't seem to be specially gratified by the fact. 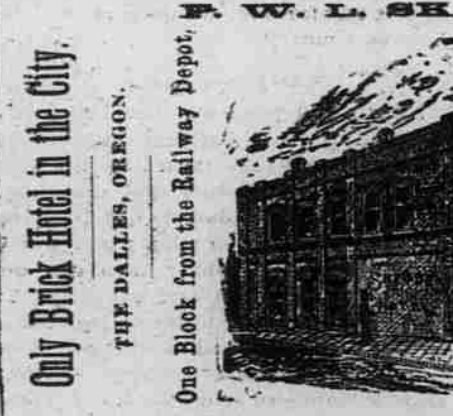

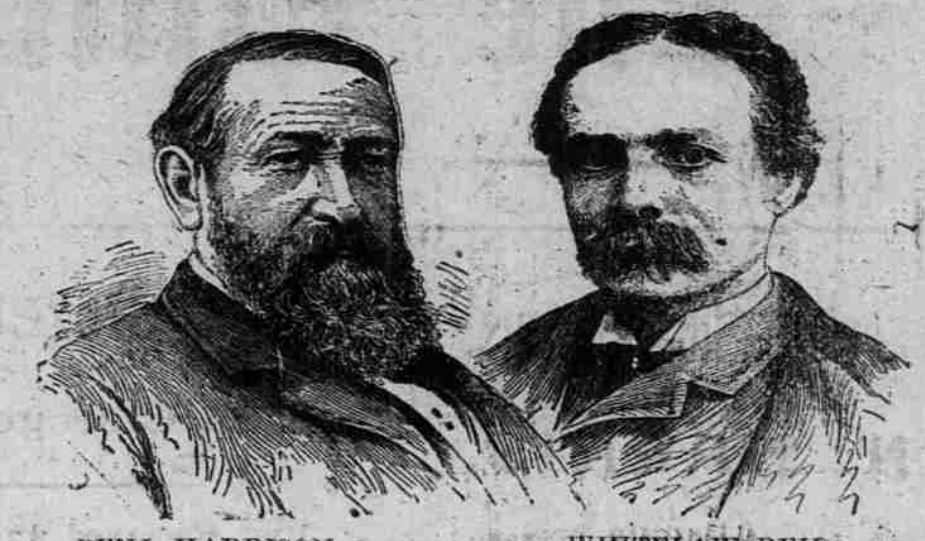
