A Railway to the Source of the Amazo The government of Eolivia has granted to Fernando Cerdens, an Argentine engineer, an important concession for the construction of a railway from Orure, Bolivia, to the head of navigation on the Amazon river, in the heart of the rubber region of Bolivia. The construction of this road will connect the min-eral regions of Bolivia with the Atlantic, and thus give cheap transportation to

The government of Bolivia has guar-anteed Senor Cerdena 6 per cent. interest annually for twenty years on the capital invested, has given him nine miles on each side of the proposed line from which to take materials for con-struction purposes, and in addition has granted him 100 square leagues of land, to be taken at intervals from the terri-tory adjacent to the road.—London En-
