THE DALLES SHIPMENTS.

Reports of wheat shipments from The Dalles during the seasons of 1890 and '91 show a big increase in the business of the place, which is not apparent to the casual observer. To illustrate: In 1890 the total shipments of grain, flour, feed and mill stuffs was 462,150 pounds. Last year it was, of wheat alone, 10,313,-295 pounds, requiring 516 cars for transportation. In 1891 3,000,000 pounds of wool was shipped from The Dalles; this year it will exceed 5,000,000 pounds. Careful estimates place the prospective shipments of wheat from The Dalles this year at 90,000,000 pounds, an increase of 79,224,555 pounds over the aggregate shipments of the two previous years. That does not look very much like a crop failure this, year, does it? The gentleman from whom these facts are obtained, has based his calculations upon a very careful survey of the situation. It is quite refreshing to be able to furnish such data as this at the present time, in view
