ARMY REUNION.

The 23d annual re-union of the society of the Army of the Cumberland will take place on the battle-field of Chickamauga, September 15th and 16th. The occasion will be a reunion of the surviving veterans of the Army of the Cumberland, both officers and privates, as well as of the society. All surviving comrades are cordially invited to attend. Half-fare arrangements have been made with the leading railroads of the country. The local committee at Chattanooga is arranging for reduced hotel and lodging rates, and for reasonable transportation to and about the various battle fields. The famous "Wilder Brigade" will be present 1,200 strong. It is expected that a large number of prominent ex-Confederate officers will be present, also.

The Portland newsboys were out on a strike yesterday. One of them explains it thus: "Ye see, we was a-gettin' our papers seven for 20, see? (seven papers for 20 cents) and now dey want t'ree cents straight. We ain't a-go'in' to pay it. We struck, and we're going to get what we ask for, and more, too. We want de paper for 2 1/2, see?" The manager of the Oregonian thinks that if it is worth two cents simply to sell the paper it should be worth three cents to make it. The boys, besides, are allowed to return unsold copies and get their money back. The Oregonian people maintain that the affair is a huge joke, and say that no advance has been made what-over. The boys can get their papers the same as they did before.

The Buffalo Express of the 13th is at hand with particulars of the beginning of the latest strike. Frank Sweeney of Chicago, grand master of the switchmen's mutual aid association of North America was present. The workmen were being paid 19, 21, and 22 1/2 cents per hour, according to places. They want 23, 25 and 27 cents per hour, according to places. Other associations on other lines, agreed to stand in with them, in case of a strike, and refuse to handle freight. Grand Master Sweeney addressed the meeting Friday August 12th, and Grand Master Sweeney ordered the strike at midnight. Fifty thousand dollars worth of property was burned up and otherwise destroyed. The end is not yet.
