THE COST OF POOR ROADS.

An interesting contribution to the discussion of American country roads comes from Prof. Richard T. Ely, who affirms that "poor roads cost this country on the average over \$20 a horse." He is sustained by Prof. Jenks of Knox college, who thinks "\$15 a horse is a low estimate for this loss."

The losses from time consumed, from wear on beast and vehicle and from repairs in indirect ways, fall principally, of course, upon those engaged in agricultural pursuits. The average cost which produce-carriers bear in hauling to the Knoxville market from the surrounding farming region is estimated at \$7.50 a load.

After detailing many public nuisances in Chicago, the News closes its list as follows: "But the worst is not yet here comes the great prize howler of the west side. 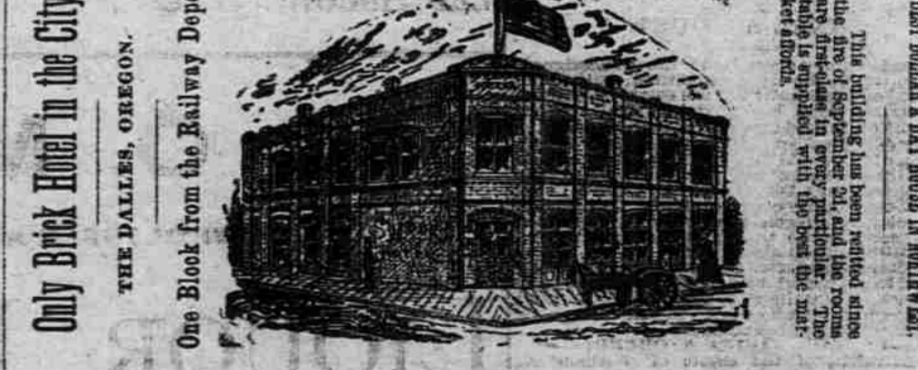
