Millard Fillmore, of New York, took the despised second place and thereby had nearly three years in the White House. General Sherman used to tell an amusing little story of Taylor's nomination for the presidency. At that time General Taylor was stationed at New Orleans. He was a Kentuckian and the Kentuckians were very properly proud of him. One day shortly before the convention met at Baltimore he was approached at New Orleans by an old Kentucky friend, who said: "General, we want you to run for president."

"Who wants me to run?" asked General Taylor seriously.

"Why, we do—all your old neighbors."

"Well, then, if that's the case," replied the old hero, without changing the expression of his face, "I reckon I'll have to run."—Detroit Free Press.
