A Regal Railway Train. The imperial railway train that has just been made to order for the German emperor has cost the Prussian exchequer nearly \$1,000,000. It is composed of eleven carriages connected by corridors and all constructed on a style of unparalleled luxury and magnificence. One carriage, which is designed to be the Kaiser's study, is hung with real Gobelin tapestry from Charlottenberg and the salon carriage is upholstered in white satin.
