THE PRESS ASSOCIATION.

At a meeting of Dalles citizens held in the circuit court room last evening at 8 o'clock, to consider the matter of the coming Press Association in this city, John Mitchell was chosen Chairman, and Geo. P. Morgan Secretary.

On motion the meeting adjourned, and the executive committee assembled, and made the following appointments of sub-committees:

The following letter was read before the committee, and ordered published:

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 12.—Noticing that there is to be a public meeting held Wednesday evening to take action on receiving the members of the Press association October 4th, I wish to say that we want you folks to go to as little trouble and expense as possible.

The object in going to Astoria one year ago, was to bring the Columbia river before the public as much as possible, and it was the same thing that prompted the choosing of The Dalles as our next place of meeting.

We are going to The Dalles for pure business. If there are any points about opening up the grand old river that you can show our members, do it, but don't ask the good citizens to go to unnecessary expense, especially when they will only get a small portion of the benefits to be derived from the visit.

Having paid close attention to the amount of advertising given Portland by the country press during the month following the annual meeting two years ago and having placed a money value upon it by taking the regular rates for advertising it amounted to \$8,000, and in addition created a better opinion of Portland than the press ever before had.

This year there are 164 publications in Oregon. Those not represented at the meeting will mention the fact any way, of the meeting, where held, object of its going to your city, etc., and while the mention in some of them will be short, you may rest assured that every line written about The Dalles and the press meeting, if cut out and charged for at regular rates, between now and the next session, would foot up something in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

As to the number who will attend, it is hard to say, but I will place it at 100, in my office. I doubt

if it exceeds that. As the press association meets the same day many of our members wish to pay a fraternal visit and return home by way of the sound. The Union Pacific has tendered transportation to Spokane, and the Northern from Spokane to Portland via the sound.

On motion the committee adjourned to meet in the county court room at 9:15 p. m. Friday Sept. 16th.
