The object in going to Astoria one year ago, was to bring the Columbia river before the public as much as pos-sible, and it was the same thing that prompted the choosing of The Dalles as

our next place of meeting.

Not only The Dalles, but the entire state will be benefitted by the session soon to be, and every newspaper should be represented, especially every publi-cation in Eastern Oregon. Let none re-

main at home.

We are going to The Dalles for pure business. If there are any points about opening up this grand old river that you can show our members, do it, but don't ask the good citizens to go to unneces-sary expense, especially when they will only get a small portion of the benefits to be derived from the visit.

Having paid close attention to the amount of advertising given Portland by the country press during the month following the annual meeting two years ago and having placed a money value upon it by taking the regular rates for advertising it amounted to \$8,000, and in addition created a better opinion of Portland than the press ever before had. As to the Astoria meeting, I figure that that city has received \$8,000 worth of advertising during the past year, that can be traced directly to the press meeting.

This year there are 164 publications in Oregon. 
