We regret to learn that the children of Hon. E. O. McCoy, of Grants, are ill with typhoid fever.

The trident-pronged scoop of the steam shovel has been undergoing repairs at the railroad shops.

The river has been raising during the last twenty-four hours, and now threatens to cover the Regulator landing.

Mr. Joelyn and Bingo took a short jaunt in the direction of the slough, and returned with several of the webfooted fowl.

Orieighton fruiteries were delighted with what they saw, in fruits grapes, etc. These orchardists are located on our high hill lands, and their production of grapes, peaches, plums, prunes, apples and melons together with other vegetables was a marvel to our guests. Those that visited the Mill Creek section was as royally pleased as those who saw the three mile region.

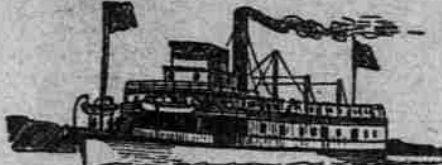

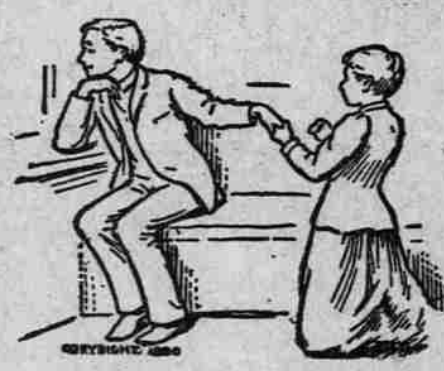
