There is no city they like better, except, of course, their own city of Portland. As Miss Thompson expressed it, they were sorry to leave Paris, but delighted to get back to Portland. They are all in excellent health, and have been besieged by their many friends, who are glad to welcome them home.

Extra Session Talk.

The strong probability of an extra session of congress immediately following the inauguration of the president-elect is the subject of general conversation in Washington. A special session of the senate is always called at the beginning of a new administration to confirm members of the cabinet and new diplomatic representatives of the United States abroad, but the present election having turned on questions of domestic policy it is said to be obvious to experienced political leaders of both parties that an extra session of both houses of congress will almost inevitably result. Secretary of the Treasury Foster, among others, admits this. The country, he says, challenges the judgment of the republicans on the McKinley bill, and the result must be accepted as the will of the people that a different policy be put into effect. Ex-Secretary Layard writes to a friend in like effect, adding that the people will expect this to be done without unnecessary delay.
