Exemptions -- "A one-Horse Transaction"

All property should be assessed at its real value, and wherever found, it would be better to assess it at 100 per cent. than at 50 per cent., and then make the levey twelve mills instead of twenty-four mills. It amounts to the same thing and makes a much better showing for the country, and it gives the true wealth. There should be no exemption for indebtedness, for it is only a convenient loophole to evade taxes, and the person that has the property in his possession and claims it as his own is the one that should pay the taxes. For instance A sells B a horse. B gives his note to A for the amount. B. has the use of the horse and all benefits derived from such use. A only has the promise of the value of the property from B. Now B has the property and should pay the taxes, and it is the same with land or any other property. RIM ROCK.
