The legislatures of twenty-seven different states are in session, and still some men laugh.

It is reported that Bishop Brooks died without making a will. Estimates place the estate at \$750,000.

The price of wheat still remains at a discouragingly low figure, regardless of the fact that there has been a change in the political complexion of the country.

It is pretty nearly decided that Hon. Thomas F. Bayard will be Cleveland's Secretary of State, Senator Carlisle secretary of the treasury, and Lamont secretary of the navy.

A London dispatch to the Exchange telegraph company says France has asked the British government for an explanation as to the increase of the British army occupation in Egypt.

Senator Teller of Colorado is quoted as saying that Judge Gresham will either be a member of Cleveland's cabinet, or a member of the supreme court. Blatchford and Field, of the supreme bench, will soon retire on account of age.

A Vienna dispatch says all hope of rescuing the men entombed in fort Schmitt mine at Dux, Bohemia, has been abandoned. Thirteen men are known to be in the mine, and it is generally conceded that those not killed by the explosion, were afterwards suffocated by damp.

The Review takes exceptions to the joint resolution of Senator Walcott, of Colorado, about the Columbo shin-plasters. The new Columbian stamps have "caught on." The public had grown rather weary of licking a portrait gallery, and the new designs, new in shape and also in scene and incident, are a decided relief.

Senator Carlisle's resignation confirms the general report that he will go into the Cleveland cabinet as secretary of the treasury. This has already excited the ire of a number of democratic newspapers of pronounced anti-silver views. The Boston Herald quotes Carlisle's record, and declares that he is "almost as rapid a silver lunatic as Bland."

Barney, pop., yesterday introduced in the Nebraska house a resolution to impeach the governor for malfeasance in office, by reason of his having approved the bond of the collapsed Capital National bank of Topeka, given to the state, under the law requiring banks to give bonds for security to the state of the money deposited with them. The resolution was laid over one day, under the rules.

The press of Oregon, says the Union-Journal of Walla Walla, are learning from her younger though bigger sister, Washington. They are strongly advocating the fixing of salaries for all county and state officials, and discarding the fee system. The Oregonian even, generally the last to get on the right side of problems in economics, protests against recompensing officers with fees, and claims that Multnomah county would save \$30,000 or more a year by paying officers of the county liberal salaries in place of the present system.

Mr. G. W. McCoy of Portland, who how has valuable interests in the Inland Empire, in a letter to the Oregonian advocates making the Barlow road across the Cascade mountains free. He argues that "as Oregon now has the whole top of the Cascade range of mountains reserved by the national government as a magnificent park, the city of Portland and the state should take such action as will make the old Barlow road free and put in good condition for travel. This road has for many years been in the hands of a toll road company, whose policy has been to make as few repairs and betterments as possible and charge high rates for toll. It is the main thoroughfare to the Inland Empire of Eastern Oregon, and is largely used by the residents of that section, as well as by overland travelers and tourists and pleasure seekers. The Portland chamber of commerce, the Oregon Alpine club and the southeast Portland improvement association should take hold of this matter, press it upon the attention of the state and secure an appropriation sufficient to put this great road in thorough repair and maintain it. By bridging the Des Chutes river at the mouth of Lake Orono canyon, to which this road already extends in almost a straight line, this road can be connected with the main stage road to Canyon city and Prineville, and the old immigrant road across the plains, both of which accommodate a great travel."
