JUDGE GRESHAM ON POLITICS

He Accepts the Premiership From a Sense of Duty to the American People.

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—A special from Cheyenne says: A sensation is promised in the reports of the senate committee in the Kime investigation. The charge is that this member, democrat, was poisoned by L. Kabis, another member, in the interest of A. L. New's candidacy for the United States senate. Kime was very ill after drinking liquor given him by Kabis. One of the witnesses testified that he was offered \$150 by Kabis to get him out of town. One of the physicians says there was a drug in the whisky. Kabis introduced evidence in defense, questioning the veracity of one deponent, and disputing the doctor. It is possible that Kabis may be expelled from the senate.

Gresham on Politics.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—The Sun's special from Chicago says: Judge Gresham will resign from the bench in time to be present at Cleveland's inauguration. Speaking of his appointment as secretary of state, the judge said today:

"It was purely duty that prompted me to accept so onerous a place. I have had all that I care for in politics. I know its shallowness and its intrigues, and surely it was neither the glamor nor the prospects for elevation that prompted me to accept this post. Look at me! I have got to that time of life, 60 years, when I need tranquility. Politics in both parties has got down to a scramble for spoils, so that political life has no attractions for me. I am beyond ambition. I am satisfied to talk about elevation."

"A man can be a man and retain his self-respect in any position in life. The only trouble is with public men that they forget that it is the office and not the man. They feel elevated at popular recognition and believe it is themselves instead of the office. Heads are turned and they forget that they are still of the people."

"I look with apprehension to going to Washington, for I certainly have no desire to return there to live. Whatever may be said, I can say that I have accepted it simply because it was urged upon me by my friends as a duty that I owe to the American people. No other reason could have induced me to leave the bench."

No More Stores for Farmers.

ABERDEEN, S. D., Feb. 17.—A receiver has been appointed for the stores of the National Union company, South Dakota. This is the company which has been doing a co-operative business for the farmers' alliance in the west. Some of the stores will continue the business for the present. The losses, it is feared, will foot up \$100,000. The headquarters of the National Union are at New York.

SALEM, Or., Feb. 17.—Daniel Durbin, of Howell Prairie, aged 61, and one of the most highly respected farmers in the county, died this afternoon from the effects of a draught of carbolio acid, which he took by mistake, thinking it water.

Hawaiian News.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 17.—The steamer Belgic arrived this morning via Honolulu. The provisional government has, in a great measure, won over the public confidence, having amply demonstrated its ability to cope with the situation. On the 21st President Dole and others paid an official visit to the Boston. The Hawaiian flag was run up to the mast-head and a salute of 21 guns fired.

On the 5th inst. martial law was declared off by the provisional government. Everybody was anxiously awaiting news from the United States, and the sentiment in favor of annexation was steadily growing. Ex-Queen Liliuokalani is still in retirement at her private residence, confident that her envoy to our government will have a successful mission. The U. S. steamer Mohican, which sailed from the Mare Island navy yard Jan. 29, was just entering the harbor of Honolulu as the Belgic sailed, but there was apparently no necessity for any increase of the naval force.

The new government now has a vice president, S. M. Damon having been selected by the executive and advisory councils. According to President Dole, the English business interests of the islands preferred that Kaulilani should rule, but they would not object to an American protectorate back of her.

WHAT THE QUEEN SAYS.

Says the queen: "It is not the Americans who are making this trouble, but those who received lands and sustenance from the Hawaiians, who are Hawaiians partly themselves, but who are now hanging between heaven and hell, and if they obtained their deserts would be in the same condition that Beelzebub and his followers were."

F. Bradford, boatman.

VIGILANT EYE TO BUSINESS.

How a Washington Firm Scoops in the Ducats.

E. O. McCoy, of Walla Walla, recently addressed to the Grant Dispatch two letters which will be of interest to settlers on the Northern Pacific land grant. The first is from Harry Spalding & Son, as follows:

"We find upon a most careful examination of the laws relating to the Northern Pacific grant that the land-office had no authority to raise the price of lands within the grant to \$2.50 per acre, and consequently you were overcharged \$198.75 for your land entry in 1884, which sum we can collect for you by suit in the Court of Claims, if authority is given us by power of attorney to file your claim at once, before it is outlawed by the statute of limitations. You will incur no expense or risk by giving us the power of attorney, as we pay all expenses, and as warrant when issued is made to your order and cannot be endorsed to any one but yourself. Our fee will be 25 per cent. of the amount recovered. Of course, if we are unsuccessful, which we do not deem possible, you will have nothing to pay either in the way of expenses or fees. Our contingent fee of 25 per cent. includes everything you will have to pay in the event of success. If you do not have description of land at hand you can leave it out, as we can ascertain from records here."

The other is from Senator J. N. Dolph. "I am just in receipt of your favor of 26th. There can be no money repaid to settlers who paid \$2.50 for railroad lands until congress passes a law for that purpose. My bill to refund \$1.25 an acre passed the senate, but is not likely to receive consideration in the house."
