## Ancient Greek Coins.

To the Lydians the innovation of coining gold and silver is attributed, and the year 862 B. C. is fixed as the era of the invention. Some 300 years after this, it may be noted, Croesus was king of Lydia. The coins of that period were not very elegant. Among the Greek banking was carried on to a considerable extent. Homer speaks of brass money among them in 418 B. C. but of weights, not coins. The art of coining was soon acquired by the Greek. The earliest coins that have been what crude.

The original method of making was by placing a given weight after it had been stamped upon which a national symbol was engraved and then with a hammer on the impression was obtained. The rude and battered and the impression on one side only. The earliest Greek coins were of silver, whereas those of Lydia were of gold—gold and silver. They were of a sacred character, and the oldcriptions were succeeded by representations of the deities.—Brooklyn Eagle
