On the morning of the last day's session of the legislature Representative Scott, Populist, introduced the following resolution: "Whereas, this legislature is now within one day of the adjournment and very little has been done for the people; [therefore be it resolved. that it is the sense of this body that the members should return the amount of their per diem and mileage to the treasury and pay the state a reasonable rental for the use of the capitol building." Mr. Scott gives evidence of good statesmanship which the future will doubtless develop.

Edward Atkinson, the eminent statistician, estimates the pension payments will attain their highest point ln 1894, when the total amount will reach \$196,000,000.
