### Telephone Company.

The Pendleton Tribune says of the Sunset Telephone and Telegraph company that the president, vice-president, secretary and general manager are in that city. These gentlemen say that it is the intention of the Sunset Telephone company to build a line from Pendleton to Baker City, passing through Union and La Grande. They have already started a line from Spokane to Portland and forty men are employed on it at present. About \$200,000 will be spent by this company on these lines and the greater part will be expended in Eastern Oregon and Washington. Their plans have been laid and work will soon begin in earnest, and Pendleton will have telephonic connections with La Grande, Union, Baker City, Spokane, The Dalles, Portland, and by the Blue Mountain Telephone Co., with Long Creek.

### Handy with His Gun.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Apr. 14.—Pete Spence of the Sentinel, yesterday killed another Mexican, making in all five in the last ten days. About a week ago Spence, who is a Texan, with no love for Mexicans on general principles, found it necessary to kill one while keeping a saloon at Gila Bend. After that the greasers formed a combination to do him up, but so far he has kept on top. All his killings have been in self defense.

### Spare the Trees.

The bell tower will soon be moved to the small lot adjoining Kirby's grocery store. It is too bad, however, that for this purpose a handsome tree was cut down. Trees are what makes The Dalles so beautiful, and while one more or less will not affect the general appearance it makes a bad precedent, when they are to be cut down for such a trifling job as this.

### Large Reward.

The amount of money offered for the capture of Tom and Bill McCarty, the alleged Roslyn bank robbers, who escaped from the officers at Haines last week, is reaching a snug sum and is a big incentive for vigilance on the part of all. The amount is \$3,700—\$2,700 for Tom and \$1,000 for Bill. The association of the former with the Denver bank robbery accounts for the larger reward.
