TO HONOR HIS MEMORY.

Indiana Will Mark the Grave of Governor Jennings.

Remarkable Character of the First Chief Executive of the Hoosier State—His Fight Against Slavery—Ruined by Drink.

The late session of the Indiana legislature made an appropriation of \$500 for the purpose of erecting a monument at the grave of Jonathan Jennings, the first governor of Indiana, and the citizens of Charlestown and Clark county have swelled the original amount appropriated by private subscription until the monument fund has reached a respectable figure.

Jonathan Jennings was one of the remarkable men of Indiana. He was born in New Jersey in 1784, removed to Pennsylvania, and while young came down the Ohio river in a flatboat and settled at Jeffersonville, where he commenced the practice of law. Soon after he was made clerk of the territorial legislature. He was elected the first territorial delegate to congress in 1809. Although a democrat young Jennings was bitterly opposed to the extension of slavery, and through his efforts more than those of any other man Indiana was admitted to the union as a free state in 1816. At the first constitutional convention held in Coryden in 1810 Jonathan Jennings was elected president of the convention and after the adjournment he announced himself a candidate for governor of the new state. At the August election of 1816 he defeated Thomas Posey, the then territorial governor, receiving 5,211 votes, his Jennings opponent 3,934 votes.

Two years later Gov. Jennings was appointed by President Monroe a commissioner to negotiate a treaty with the Indians, and after a bitter legal contest he held the office of governor as well as commissioner. He was re-elected governor in 1820 and resigned the governorship in 1822, having been elected to congress. He served four terms in the lower house of congress and was defeated for a fifth term by Gen. John Carr. On retiring from congress Mr. Jennings removed to his farm near Charlestown. The ex-governor's

governor and his second wife, even the governor's convivial habits causing no ripple on the sea of domestic bliss. The ex-governor was taken ill in July, 1834, and on the 26th of that month he passed away, surrounded by his family and many devoted friends. The next day the remains were placed in a common farm wagon and taken to the little cemetery, situated on a high hill in the western part of Charlestown, and there interred. The grave will soon be marked by a monument of Vermont granite. The old house in which Gov. Jennings and Miss Barbee were married and where the governor held his first reception still stands on a corner of one of Charlestown's pretty streets after having stood the ravages of nearly a century.
