This is liable to continue until the first of the month. The market will also likely work close for the first 10 days in July, as it is esti-

mated it will take at least that time to restore money called into the normal channels. The stock exchange houses are prepared for a siege of this sort and are discouraging speculation. Time money and mercantile paper are merely nominal. Foreign exchange is heavy and demoralized; posted rates were reduced 1 per cent to \$4.83 to \$4.85. MR. KOSHLAND ON TRIAL.

He Has a Formidable Array of Legal Talent.

PORTLAND, Or., June 26 .- It has been many months since a case has appeared in the criminal courts of Portland in which so much interest has been taken by the public generally as that against merchant Matthias Koshland, which came up this morning.

Henry McGinn, for the prosecution, stated that the prosecution was based on on the statute passed by the session of the legislature of 1885, referring to the receipts issued by warehouses for goods stored in the building. That the jury might understand the grounds for the indictments returned by the grand jury, he read the sections which referred to the point at issue.
