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

The United States, it is argued, could afford to undertake a gigantic financial operation, being able to feed it, and has now a wonderful opportunity to settle the silver question permanently. Senator Dolph on the Sherman Law.

Washington, June 27 .- Senator Dolph, of Oregon, the only Pacific slope senator in the city, said this morning:

"I am opposed to my colleagues, you know on the subject of free coinage, and am in favor of maintaining all currency on a par with gold; but it seems to me this action of the Indian government will diminish, instead of increase, the prospect of passing a repeal of the Sherman law by the senate. I think the effect

will be to make the thoughtful members of congress hesitate before they further depreciate the value of silver by suddenly throwing upon the markets of the world 4,500,000 ounces of silver, equivalent to nearly the whole American product now purchased and in stock by the government. I do not know that anything better than a repeal of the Sherman act can be done to relieve the situation, but I am fearful a repeal of that act would be disastrous to the finances of the goverament and silver."
