From a statement prepared at the treasury department the actual loss to the government through the operations of the Sherman silver law is figured. From this statement it appears that up to the end of the fiscal year 136,664,590 fine ounces of silver have been purchased by the government since the Sherman law went into effect. This amount of silver cost the government \$147,138,875. At the price of silver at the end of the fiscal year, about 62 cents per fine ounce, the purchases of the white metal would now be worth \$92,132,046, showing an actual loss of about \$55,000,000.

It is very hard to make visitors at the world's fair believe that the fine strawberries which are exhibited from Oregon and have been there for several weeks really came from Oregon. They cannot understand how a state as far north as Maine can send strawberries east almost as soon as Georgia or Florida. It does look slightly impossible, but it is a fact nevertheless.—Pacific Farmer.

The Washington National bank of Spokane reopened its doors Thursday, and at 3 p. m. was \$35,000 ahead. There was a run of depositors to deposit. This bank has now the finest chance in the world to make fortunes for its management. With confidence completely restored it can lend money at a time when it will bring the highest interest since war times and on security absolutely gilt-edged.

A new vegetable is to be introduced into the United States by the department of agriculture. It is the root of the calla lily, that resembles somewhat in appearance the ordinary Irish potato. So prolific and palatable is the root of this plant that its propagation in many parts of the United States, where conditions are favorable, may be looked for as a future agricultural industry.

A massive pyramid on the summit of the Union Pacific road at Sherman, Wyo., taken from a mountain of granite near by, perpetuates the memory of Oakes Ames, founder of the Union Pacific railroad. Were this monument to represent the latter-day greed of this same road, the quarry would be a hole in the ground.

A terribly destructive cyclone is reported from Iowa. No resistance is possible to these calamities, and their fatal effects are only confined to the field over which they sweep. In this case it traveled over a thickly populated section of country, and the lives lost reach into the hundreds.

A statement prepared by the controller of the currency shows that the amount of national bank notes outstanding is \$178,614,535, an increase during the fiscal year ended June 30th of \$6,938,897.

About all the cash a country needs is enough to make up for its want of confidence and credit.

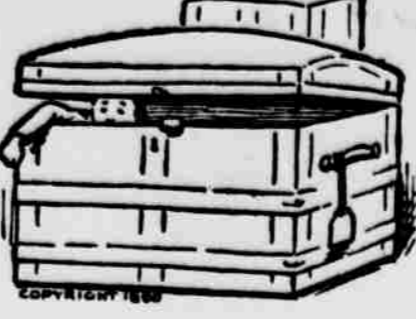

"Dern A Dog, Anyhow."

The mayor's recent statement about dogs has awoke Cradlebaugh into the following witty paragraph. Mr. Cradlebaugh overlooked one important fact that we will mention right here. The present debt of the city is \$33,000, and the mayor is very anxious to liquidate it. A tax of \$2.50 on each dog will pay the entire city indebtedness. Mr. Cradlebaugh says:



Mayor Rinehart of The Dalles says there are from 10,000 to 15,000 dogs in that city that are unlicensed. We knew our neighboring town had a phenomenal crop of canines, but we were totally unprepared for the grand total as stated by the mayor. According to this there are three dogs and a pup for each man, woman and child. At one pound of meat per day these dogs would eat say 12,000 pounds of beef, requiring thirty head of beeves daily. We are forced to believe that The Dalles is a better town for butchers than for candidates for city office on the democratic ticket. We further timidly suggest to the honorable mayor that he obey the injunction to "throw physic to the dogs," and, as it were, curtail both species and number. Fifty thousand dogs are too many for one town, anyhow. Strung out heads and tails, made into one longitudinal dog, so to speak, 15,000 dogs each four feet long, including tail, would equal a string of dogs, metaphorically speaking, 60,000 feet long—long enough to reach from The Dalles to Dufur, and that is too dogged long a dog for any one. Oh, pshaw! Dr., give us a reduction, a special rate on dogs. Fifteen thousand dogs weighing say 30 pounds each, would make a grand total of 450,000 pounds of dog, 225 tons, not counting the bark, and its putting on too much dog that way, even for The Dalles. We believe the mayor was mistaken, that, metaphorically speaking, he has been counting his chickens before they were hatched, and his estimate is made on possibilities. He is dealing in futures, and his statement is dog-matical. Anyway we figure it there is too much dog, and we—well we won't believe it. Besides, suppose that all these dogs' pants should give out at once, say in the dog days and every dog has his day, and they had to wander up the back alley with nothing on but a collar, what would the administration do then? That's what we'd like to know. But we drop the subject; it is too discursive for us.
