Ran on Garda Rocks.

San Francisco, July 10.-The British tramp steamer Rawnmore, which sailed from this port for Nanaimo in ballast last Friday, ran on Garda rocks at 6 began to fill. The Bawnmore was never a fast steamer, and her crew now realized that unless assistance could be had the chances of the ship's reaching San Francisco were very slim. Captain Woodsides hoisted a signal of distress. It was seen by the steam schooner Del Norte, which took the disabled ship in tow and started for the Golden Gate. The Del Norte held on to the Bawnmore for six hours and then the hawser doomed, the crew hastily packed up their clothes and prepared to leave her. Captain Woodsides refused to leave his vessel, however, and said he would sink or swim with her. A dispatch to the Merchant's Exchange this morning HORSES from Caspar, Mendocino county, states that the steamers Emily and Weeott have arrived there with the British steamer Bawnmore in tow, and beached the vessel.

Wanted for Murder.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., July 10.-There was a race over the mountains last night on the Ashland-Klamath Falls road, between Tom Shattuck, sheriff of Josephine, and a brace of constables from the same locality. There is \$500 reward offered for the capture of the murderer of Antone Joseph, who was assassinated on Williams creek in Josephine county two weeks ago. Sheriff Gowan has under arrest Charles Slagle, aged 22, charged with arson committed here on June 4th, and there is strong evidence that he did the killing. Slagle was held in \$5,000 bonds today to appear before the grand jury for the local crime, and the Josephine officers cannot gain possession of the prisoner. G. W. Meek was also arrested here by Sheriff Gowan today on suspicion of being implicated in the murder.

They preach the early end of the world with the fervor of fanatics. Hundreds flock to hear them.
