AGRICULTURAL FIGURES.

IOWA raised 229,000,000 bushels of corn last year.

THE Indian corn crop of 1892 was 1,625,464,000 bushels; the wheat crop 519,490,000.

In India there are 139 cotton mills, with 3,400,000 spindles and 25,000 looms, employing 116,000 persons. There are also eight new mills now in course of construction.

The canning industry is making great headway in Georgia, and, in view of the probability of a fine crop this season, that state is likely to be one of the most profitable fields for fruit growers in the country.

The largest grain fleet that ever left Chicago at the opening of navigation was composed of one hundred and fifty steam and sailing vessels, which left that city for the lower lake ports April 15, with 11,000,000 bushels of grain.
