Both Charged with "Conspiracy to Defraud the Government"--- Charles D. Cardinell Included.

PORTLAND, July 17 .- James Lotan, excollector of customs of the port of Portland, gave himself up to the United States marshal at noon today, to answer to the charge of two indictments preferred against him by the federal grand

Robert G. Paddock, deputy inspector of the customs service, was arrested before noon, on the same charge as preferred against Lotan.

The charges against both men are to the effect that they were engaged in a conspiracy against the government of the United States. There are two accusations made by the grand jury. One is that they defrauded the government of revenue duties due on certain quantities of opium brought into this port.

The second allegation is that they landed Chinamen from off steamers from British Columbia ports on fraudulent certificates.
