A Marvelous Escape.

The fiendish ingenuity of things inanimate finds a very good example in the following, from the Goldendale Sentinel: James Burgen, son of Thomas Burgen of Chamberlain Flat, had a close call one day last week that resulted in a marvelous escape from death. He was on top of a load of hay and was unwinding the lines from the upright stake in front of the rack when the stake gave way and he fell forward on to the doubletrees, part of the load of hay falling on top of him as the team started on a dead run. In this position he was partly dragged and partly carried for about two hundred yards, when he crawled on top of the tongue and from thence on to one of the horses. Just then and while the horse was bucking vigorously, one wheel struck a rock and the sudden halt threw Mr. Burgen to the ground. One wheel passed diagonally over his leg a little above the ankle and over one arm. Then the rack whole load, rack and all, fell on top of him. His father and Mr. Stedham had followed the runaway team as fast as possible, and as Mr. Stedham came up Cor. Court and Second Sts. to the wreck James crawled out and started to catch the horses, which were still running with the wagon attached. He had gone only a little way when he was compelled to desist. An examination showed that beyond being bruised at the places where the wheel passed over him, Mr. Burgen was not otherwise injured and will soon be as well as ever. But it was a marvelous escape, and those who saw the accident never expected to see James come out of it alive. The team finally ran up against a fence, and neither the team nor the wagon were found injured in the least.


