Teachers' Institute.

Hood River, Aug. 3, 1893.
The institute is daily growing in numbers, interest and enthusiasm. Since the oppressive heat of Monday, the weather has been very favorable to the work, and both instructors and classes are at hand, honest and efficient work which will be manifest in many schools during the ensuing year. No teacher can afford to be absent. Some come down on the boat in the morning and leave in the afternoon each day. These lose a part of the instruction.

The attendance of teachers is the largest that has ever been in this county, the enrollment being fifty-four.

The excursion question was very quickly settled by an almost unanimous vote to visit the Cascade Locks. The officers of the Regulator would do well to make up their minds to an unconditional surrender when they land here next Saturday morning.
