Small Aftendance in the House During the Silver Debate.

AN EXODUS TO THE SEASHORE

There Most of the Members Will Remain Until the Day Set for a Vote, Returning Only to Speak.

Washington, Aug. 12 .- The silver debate in the house today did not attract much public interest. The knowledge that no vote can possibly be reached until August 28th causes the members to considered its action on the currency take little interest in the proceedings and it is doubtful whether there was a quorum present in the house today. Many members left for the seaside last night resolved to remain until it should be time for them to return to deliver a speech, and nearly every member is preparing one on the financial situation. It seems likely that the daily speciacle in the house for the next two weeks will be that of an impassioned individual delivering a fiery speech to a score or two of his personal friends and an array of 200 or 300 empty benches.
