Sullivan, ex-champion pugilist of the world, had a narrow escape from death at the hands of a fellow sport the other evening in the barroom of the Vanderbilt hotel, at Lexington avenue and Fortysecond street. The particulars of the quarrel leading up to the shooting affray have been carefully guarded. Sullivan entered the barroom at about 8 o'clock in the evening. He had been drinking heavily and was in an ugly mood. He was accompanied by two old friends. He lurched into the room, and, facing the counter, ordered wine for every one in the place. Destructive Fire at Minneapolis. MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 14.-A big fire stopped last night at Twentieth avenue North, after burning nearly a square mile of territory. It destroyed about 15 houses, averaging in value from \$500 to \$3,000; 40,000,000 feet of lumber, worth \$480,000; 13 mills, mostly saw mills, and sash and door factories, and a number of icehouses and smaller concerns, bringing the total loss up to about \$1,-158,000, with estimated insurance \$750, 000. National Bank Notes.

OTHER LEGISLATION INTRODUCED

Senator Hill's Objection --- The Situation Is Already Improved, and \$20,-000,000 More is Coming.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 .- In the senate, oorhees introduced a bill authorizing an issue of national bank notes of the full value of bonds deposited. The bill was accompanied by a letter from Secretary Carlisle urging its immediate passage. The bill would add \$19,000,000 to the circulation. Referred to finance

The Republican Programme.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 .- Leading republicans of the house announce their intention of taking little or no part in the silver debate, on the ground that they were refused a chance to amend the order regulating the debate. They declare that they did not believe free silver or silver, which are the only two alternatives possible in the Bland order, were the only two possible solutions of the situation.
