NOW IN CONTROL OF THE COURTS

The Appointments Made in New York This Morning--- No Surprise to Wall Street.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15 .- Thomas F. dent of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas tariff during the 53d congress. railroad company, were this afternoon appointed receivers of the Northern Pacific railroad in the United States court in this city.

The appointment of receivers did not come as a surprise to the street, although not announced until after 3 o'clock. Brokers were prepared for the news, as rumors of such stories had been plentiful all day. Most of the stock and bonds recently have been taken, it is said, by Philadelphia parties. The principal selling today was by commission houses long stock.

The Post this evening states that it is reported that a receiver may be appointed for the North American also.

Judge Larcombe appointed the receivers on motion of the Farmers' Loan & Trust Company and Phillip D. Winston and William C. Sheldon, William L. Day City. Price and William C. Sheldon & Co., as all railroads owned, leased or controlled by said corporations.

These receivers are the same as those appointed in Wisconsin. They gave court there, and were ordered to give a bond of \$500,000 here.

ANNIE FAXON DISASTER.

Additional Particulars Regarding the Explosion.

Additional particulars concerning the explosion of the steamer Annie Faxon titute circumstances. are to the effect that the boat was attempting to land at Waite's bar, forty miles below Lewiston, at 7 o'clock a. m., and when about eight feet from the shore the boiler exploded. Captain Edward Baughman, son of Captain E. W. Banghman, was in the pilot-house at the time between two passengers, Tom McIntosh and I. C. Sargent.

Captain Baughman saw McIntosh's head cleft in twain, and was at that moment stricken senseless. The same shock which rendered him unconscious also threw him on shore, where he recovered two hours later.

The explosion wrecked the boat. throwing some of the passengers into the stream, where those who could. grasped the floating wreckage until they were rescued by boats launched by survivors of the wreck.

There were five passengers on board besides the crew of fifteen. The boat now lies in about eight feet of water, and is forty feet from the shore. She is almost a total wreck. Captain Pegram will leave this evening for Riparia, and will look after the bodies of these who were killed, and the proper care of the injured.

Railroad house joint memorial praying for the re- Award of the Behring Sea Tribunal of Arbitration.

THE CLOSE SEASON ESTABLISHED

The Use of Firearms in Sealing Is Prohibited -- The End of Pelagic Sealing.

Paris, Aug. 15.-The decision of the Behring sea tribunal of arbitration was handed down at 11:15 o'clock this morning. Five points of article 6 are decided against the United States. A close season is established to begin May 1st and to continue until July 31st. This close season shall be observed both in the North Pacific ocean and in Behring sea. A protected zone is established extending for 60 miles around the islands. Pelagic sealing is allowed outside the zone in Behring sea from August 1st. The use of firearms in sealing is pro-

The American arbitrators have expressed their satisfaction with the text

Baron de Courcel, after the decision was rendered, thanked the arbitrators acknowledged his courtesy and hospitality.
