### Wants Carlisle Impeached.

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 16.—The Advocate, the official state paper, in an editorial today demands the impeachment of Secretary Carlisle for having failed to purchase 4,500,000 ounces of silver, according to the Sherman law, during July. It says that Secretary Carlisle grossly violated his oath of office, and that President Cleveland is equally guilty and should be impeached at the same time, provided that an investigation it is found that he is responsible for Mr. Carlisle's conduct. Resolutions embodying the Advocate's editorial will be introduced in the populists' bimetalist meetings, to be held in each county of the state between now and August 21st.
