The "Victoria cross," which we often read of having been conferred upon some British soldier for conspicuous bravery, is of the Maltese form, made from Russian cannons captured at Sebastopol.

A bill has been introduced in the house by Richardson, of Tennessee, democratic, which is very radical in its provisions. He proposes a tax of 2 per cent. on \$3,000 to \$5,000, 5 per cent. on \$5,000 to \$10,000, 10 per cent. on \$10,000 to \$20,000, 15 per cent. on \$20,000 to \$30,000, 20 per cent. on \$30,000 to \$50,000, 30 per cent. on \$50,000 to \$100,000, 40 per cent. on all over \$100,000 incomes.

It costs 15 or 20 cents a bushel to ship wheat from the Pacific coast to Europe. With a canal across the isthmus of Central America it would cost 5 cents a bushel. This means a saving of from \$3,000,000 or \$4,000,000 to California wheat interests alone. It means a great addition to the export trade of Washington and Oregon. These facts and figures will continue to render the canal a live issue, notwithstanding the misfortune which has overtaken the Nicaragua project.

Miss Hattie Horner, the Kansas poetess, was married the other day. The ceremony took place under the patriarchal trees of the parental estate—the very branches under which Hattie was wont to woo the muse. The bride was dressed in pure white, and the local paper says she looked like a wood nymph; the pictures down in the art building lead to the belief that wood nymphs don't wear white clothes—or any clothes at all, for that matter. However, the whole affair was pastoral, poetic and charming to the last degree.

Secretary Morton reminds the croakers that only about 3 per cent. of all the merchants escape failure, whereas hardly 3 per cent. of the farmers fail. The statistics really show that agriculture is safer than banking, manufacturing, or railroading, taking all things into account. There is no farmer of good sense and good health anywhere in the West, Mr. Morton declares, who cannot make a good living for himself and family, and that is as well as the majority of men are doing in any other pursuit. The man who owns a farm and sticks to it is certain to profit by it in the future. There is practically no more land to be added to the area of cultivation. The supply of agricultural products has just about reached its limit in the United States, and must now remain stationary while the demand will go on increasing every year. This implies a gradual improvement in prices, and a steady appreciation of the value of all farming lands.

NEWS NOTES.

Yesterday began the G. A. R. encampment in Indianapolis. The city is crowded with visitors.

The engineers of the Annie Faxon are exonerated from the responsibility of the explosion, according to a recent investigation.

Senator Dolph has introduced a bill providing an apportionment of a quarter of a million to deport the Chinese under the Geary act.

Nat Blinn, the opium smuggler, was rearrested in San Francisco, his bonds not being satisfactory. He must secure \$5,000 more acceptable to the court, or be returned to Portland.

John H. O'Connor of Chicago, shot and probably mortally wounded his partner in the tin and sheet-iron business yesterday. He also killed a little girl, name unknown.

Among the other house bills introduced are: To provide for the admission of Arizona; to enable the people of New Mexico, Utah, Arizona and Oklahoma to form a constitution and state government and be admitted into the union.

Reiter a rich widower of Warren, O., was to have married a Newcastle lady, the latter imposing as a condition that she should be given \$20,000. The money was placed in the hands of Warren Smith, who decamped with it, and now Reiter is out both money and bride.

The financial policy of the administration was clearly defined Monday. It is that all secondary financial legislation shall be postponed till the senate acts on the repeal bill. The object is to put spurs on the senate by concentrating public attention on it.

A Travesty on Justice.

Cal Smith of Caleb, Grant county, who was convicted last November of the crime of assaulting his daughter with intent to kill her, and was sentenced to six years in the penitentiary, was this week granted a full pardon by Gov. Penneyer, for the reason that "his family is in need of his assistance and the sentence is excessive."

The Fossil Journal calls this a travesty on justice and relates the particulars of the crime. This man Smith, whose family needs his support, is a gambler, horse-racing man and all round "sport," and the reader can well imagine the kind of assistance such a man is likely to lend his family. He habitually abused his wife, and the murderous assault upon his young daughter Kitty, because she wanted some say in a matrimonial venture that deeply concerned herself, is yet fresh in the memory of the reader. He beat her over the head with a stew pan, and knocked her down with a rock when she essayed to run, afterwards jumping upon her prostrate body. It was his intention to kill her outright, and that he was prevented from doing so was no fault of his. It will surprise no one in the community in which they live should Smith yet kill his wife and daughter.

Wants a New School Room.

At the school house on the bluff yesterday morning, I noticed several young Americans, our future rulers. This was a day long to be remembered by them, as it was their first day at school, and several of the little ones had walked nearly two miles to the school. Flour, Bran and Feed.

U. S. Indian Service, Warm Springs Agency.

WARM SPRINGS, Oregon Co., Or., Aug. 5, 1893.
 Sealed proposals indorsed "Proposals for Flour, Bran and Feed," as the case may be, and addressed to the undersigned at Warm Springs, Oregon, will be received at this agency until 1 o'clock P. M. of Tuesday, September 15, 1893, for furnishing and delivering at the agency about 4,000 lbs. of flour, 20,000 lbs. of bran, and 20,000 lbs. of feed.
 Flour must be either what is known as "straight full stock" of good sound wheat—so ground down to about 42 lbs. of flour, low grades to be taken out, or it may be what is known as "patent flour," and delivered in extra strong single cotton sacks to weigh 49 pounds to the yard. Samples of not less than 20 lbs. must be furnished by bidders, said samples to be distinctly marked with the name of the bidder and the number of the sample if more than one is submitted.
 Bran must be of good quality; equal parts bran and shorts mixed; samples of not less than 20 lbs. must be furnished by bidders.
 Feed must be clear barley, fresh rolled, free from dirt and rust; samples of not less than 20 lbs. must be furnished by bidders.
 Delivery.—Of the above there is to be delivered at the stinemascho school, located 20 miles north of the agency, 24,000 lbs. of flour, 10,000 lbs. of bran, and 10,000 lbs. of feed; and at the agency, 10,000 lbs. of flour, 10,000 lbs. of bran, and 10,000 lbs. of feed. All articles are to be subject to a rigid inspection.

Proposals must state specifically the proposed price of each article offered for delivery under a contract by the U. S., not barrels or tons.
 The right is reserved to reject any or all bids, or any part of any bid if deemed for the best interest of the service.
 Certified checks.—Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check or draft upon some United States depository or solvent national bank in the vicinity of the residence of the bidder, made payable to the order of the commissioner of Indian Affairs, for at least 10 per cent. of the amount of the proposal which check or draft will be forfeited to the United States in case any bidder or bidders receiving an award shall fail to promptly execute sureties, check or draft to be returned to the bidder.
 Bids accompanied by cash in lieu of a certified check will not be considered.
