HORNS AND MILK.

How Vetermary Would Increase the Usefulness of Cows. The removal or suppression of the

horns of cows increases the supply of milk, and the animal fattens better; the fact is a strange one, says the Boston Globe, but there is no doubt about it. The horns are not of much use, and, on the other hand, are often the cause of accidents.

The removal of the horns of young October 10th, 1893, animals was recommended years ago by a distinguished veterinary surgeon, and Neumann demonstrated that cows without horns were fatter and gave more milk than others.

He saw four Dutch cows without horns give from eighteen to nineteen quarts of milk a day although on indifferent pastures, whereas others of the same breed, but with horns, only gave twelve to fifteen quarts, in spite of the fact that they had the advantage of excellent grazing land. American breeders have made experiments which amply confirm the statements made above.

Those in favor of the removal of . the horns do not in the least intend to countenance any act of cruelty: the removal would be effected in a simple and easy manner, by destroying the tissue or root of the horn, as soon as there was the slightest sign of hardening on the forehead of the young animal.

But without entering into any discussion on this head, simply note the fact that the removal of the horns increases the supply of milk.

Although strange at first sight, it

does not appear so extraordinary upon consideration. It is known by experience that the removal of an organ which has no utility lends to beneficial results in other ways.

By then closing the mouth and blowing hard the cheeks are filled with air, so that a person seems to have a little balloon on each side of the face. It is almost impossible to sink in that condition. After leaving the water a gentle pressure of the hand forces out the air and the cheek resumes the normal shape, It is therefore possible for every man to be his own life preserver.-Paris American Register.
