The Perfect Ear.

In McClure's Magazine Prof. Henry Drummond discusses the question of where man got his ears. Nature, he holds, seldom makes anything new; her method of creation is to adopt something old. So when land animals were determined on, and nature started out to manufacture ears for them, she made them out of old breathing apparatus. She saw, Prof. Drummond contends, that if water could pass through a hole in the neck, such as fishes have, would pass likewise, therefore she brought certain species adapted to her purpose to shore and set to work upon the dry gills-slits and elaborated the whole in a hearing organ. This was not a quick process, but the slow labor of ages, but finally was produced the perfect ear, and man was not created until the work was done.

Bricks of Glass.

In Switzerland there is now being manufactured a glass brick or a brown building block, formed or molded flask shape with a short neck at each end, eight inches in length, six inches in width and two and one-half inches in depth with an air chamber through the center. The edges of the brick are covered, recessed or ribbed and grooved to receive when laid a suitable cement of plastic material of such character that after it has hardened it will constitute a suitable frame or setting to keep the entire mass roof or wall, solidly together. The form or mold—there being two different shapes—are pleasing to the eye, the lines or ridges being clean and smooth and of sufficient thickness or strength to stand a pressure of one hundred and fifty to two hundred pounds to the square foot.
