The Government Seal.

When on July 4, 1776, the continental congress declared the English-American colonies to be free and independent states, they appointed a committee to report a device for a seal—the emblem of sovereignty. That committee and others from time to time presented unsatisfactory devices. Finally, in the spring of 1782, Charles Thompson, the secretary of congress, gave to that body a device largely suggested to John Adams, then United States minister to the court of Great Britain, by Sir John Prestwich, an eminent English antiquary. This suggestion was made the basis of a design adopted by congress, June 20, 1782, and which is still the device of the great seal of the republic.
