Former Mail Service.

Less than fifty years ago there was really no postal system in this country. Previous to 1847 the mails were carried by private firms, and rates varied according to distance. Carriers often traveled on foot or horseback and the progress was slow. In 1846 some of the post offices issued stamps of their own, called "provisional issues." The adhesive stamp was first used in this country in 1847, and prepayment was made compulsory in 1853. In 1853 the stamp containing the head of Andrew Jackson was issued, and from then until 1853 the style adopted contained the profiles of presidents of the United States.
