

Wilson introduced a resolution authorizing the committee on ways and means to sit during adjournment and consider the tariff bill. The redublicans refused to answer to the names and there was not a quorum, the ayes being 157 and noes 1.

The house is ready to adjourn today, but the senate desires to dispose of the Chinese bill, if possible, and the nominations which fail of confirmation when the senate adjourns lapse and must be sent to the senate again. The nomination over which is the most contention is that of Judge Hornblower, of New York, for a place on the supreme bench. The general belief is that Hill has effected a combination against him, and that he will be defeated.

The house bill to extend time for the execution of the Chinese exclusion act was taken up. Davis offered an amendment re-enacting the act of July 6, 1884, and continuing such act in force 10 years longer. The act of 1892 required a Chinese person when accused of being unlawfully in the country to prove his innocence.
