In 1892 there were 1,395 vessels of all kinds built in the United States, with an estimate tonnage of 199,000,000. SINCE the establishment of our life-

saving service in 1871, 9,989 persons have been succored at the stations. THE life-saving service on the British

coast was established in 1824, and has been the means of saving 34,043 lives. THE naval warfare of the world was revolutionized by the battle between the Merrimae and Monitor, March 9,

In 1670 the Dutch owned and operated one-half of the world's shipping: now they own about 1 per cent. of the whole.

OVER 80 per cent. of the shipping of the world is built on the British Isles, and nearly one-half of this on the Clyde.

ONLY one-fourth of the American shipping is engaged on the high seas, 77 per cent. being river, lake and coasting trade.

THE navigable river mileage of Euope, Asia and America is 144,732 miles. The United States has the greatest river mileage, 47,355.
