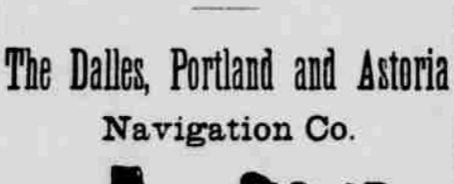

EPIDEMIC OF CRANKS

There is an Avowed Assassin Loose in Washington.

HE IS A MINER FROM IDAHO

Wants to Kill President Cleveland,

Whom He Holds Responsible for the Repeal Law.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—A number of officers in citizens' dress have been detailed to guard the white house and to protect the life of the president, who is supposed to be in danger from a murderous crank who is at large in the city. Last Wednesday there arrived in Washington a man who keeps a restaurant in Boise City, Idaho. The name of the man the police refuse to divulge. Yesterday he went to the chief of police and told his story. He said that about a week ago a miner, who was out of employment, came to his restaurant, and in a heated discussion about the silver question and the effects of the repeal bill on the mining interests of the west, declared, with emphasis, that he was going to Washington, and if the repeal bill passed unconditionally he would kill the man whom he knew should be held responsible. The restaurant-keeper did not know the man, but, as he disappeared from Boise, he concluded it was his duty to come here and notify the authorities. He arrived Wednesday, and that afternoon strolled up to the white house promenade. The first person he saw was the miner with whom he had the altercation. As soon as the man saw him he took to his heels. The restaurant keeper thought possibly it was a case of mistaken identity, and he said nothing to anybody until the next day, when he again went to the white house and saw the same man lurking there. As there was no mistake, he went to the chief of police and told his story, giving a full description of the man. As a precautionary measure a number of officers have been detailed to guard the white house and detectives are looking for the man who vows himself to be the intended assassin. The police declare they do not believe there is any danger, but say that precaution is being taken to guard against possible contingencies. The matter is being kept very quiet.

MAYOR OF CHICAGO.

Disgraceful Scene Enacted in the Council Chamber.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—Such scenes were never before enacted in the city council chamber of this city as transpired there today. Before the craped-draped speaker's desk stood two aldermen, political opponents, each declaring himself to be chairman of the body. The reading clerk leaped upon the back of one of the contestants and tried to eject him. Another clerk tore up the resolution, because it was not in line with what his party desired. Over the somber-draped rails of the speaker's stand leaped another alderman upon the back of the clerk, and his colleagues flocked to his aid. Upon him jumped an alderman of the opposing faction, and clutching at the throat of the man who, by force, was trying to get before the council that which should have legally been received. Police officials rushed into the enclosure to separate the struggling aldermen, and in the fight that ensued the crape which hung at the desk of the dead Mayor was rent, torn down and trampled under foot. The men who three days ago spent money and labor to honor mayor Harrison disgraced his memory today by a disgraceful brawl over the right to sit for 20 minutes in his chair. Tonight the council chamber is guarded by police officers and no one is allowed to enter.

HAVOC AND DEATH.

A Fire Aboard a Ship Explodes Her Cargo of Dynamite.

MADRID, Nov. 4.—From Boo, a village near Santander, the capital of the province of that name, comes a frightful story of explosion, fire, havoc and death. A steamer with a cargo of dynamite arrived at Santander. The fact of the explosive being aboard was unknown to the authorities. Last evening the vessel took fire and the fire department hurried to the scene to prevent the spread of the flames to the other shipping, to the docks and to adjoining houses. The governor of the province, chief municipal officers and many leading citizens were superintending the work of subduing the flames. Just as the news was spread that the vessel contained dynamite, and the people started panic-stricken from the scene, the flames reached the terrible cargo and with a deafening roar it exploded, scattering death, fire and destruction on every side. The wharves, shipping and neighboring houses were torn to fragments. The whole city was shaken as if by an earthquake, and windows shattered in every house for miles around. Among the prominent people missing is the governor of the province, who was last seen on deck fighting the flames in the front ranks. Among those reported killed is Marquis Pombal. According to the official estimates, the dead will number over 300.

DANGERS OF THE DESERT.

A Prospector and Miner's Narrow Escape From Death.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Nov. 4.—One Miller, a prospector and miner, came near adding his bones to the list of unknown skeletons now bleaching on the desert. He left Campo about a week ago for Yuma, and though an experienced miner, became confused before going far on the desert, on account of the obliteration of trails by sandstorms. Within a few hours from the time he was lost, death stared him in the face in the form of thirst. With great will-power and presence of mind he calmed himself and decided that the only way to save his life was to take the back track and try to reach the Pecos, on the western side of the desert. He retraced his steps as rapidly as possible, suffering terribly from thirst, and occasionally in great peril from the hallucinations of delirium and the false attractions of mirages, which almost drew him from the trail to drink of imaginary springs. He finally reached the foothills and found his way to Campo badly used up. After recuperating and refitting he will again attempt to reach Yuma.

Attempt to Rob a Train.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 4.—As the south-bound train on the Missouri Pacific was leaving Union Junction, just north of Nebraska City, this morning two negroes crawled to the engine and ordered the engineer and firemen to throw up their hands. The order was obeyed with alacrity, but in the hands that came up were clasped revolvers, and the engineer and fireman opened on the intruders, who fled. One man was recognized by the engineer as a resident of Nebraska City and a general tough there. A posse was made up on the train and started in pursuit of the robbers.

Arming for Fight.

Negotiations for the purchase of the swift little steamer Yankee Doodle, claimed to be the fastest in the world, are pending with McBride Bros., the owners, by the Brazilian government. It is rumored that Flint & Co. are negotiating with the Metropolitan Steamship Company for the purchase of one of the two fine steamers Herman Winter and H. F. Dimock for the use of Peixoto.

Agents of the Brazilian rebel, Admiral Mello, have been in Birmingham negotiating for the purchase of arms and ammunition.
